

Description of District: Akron CSD

The Akron Central School District is located in Akron, NY. The district encompasses approximately 90 square miles and has a total population of about 11,000 residents. The Tonawanda Indian Reservation is located adjacent to district boundaries and all reservation children have attended Akron Central School since the 1930's. Native American children have completely integrated into the school system and the reservation itself has strong political influence.

The school plant is located within village boundaries. The building is a large, one-site complex that is located on approximately 68 acres of land.

The village itself has much to offer: half-century old homes which are neat and well cared for, a beautiful county park facility and a nice blend of small and large businesses scattered amongst residential homes. A large industrial complex, housing five major industries, is located within the village and employs nearly 800 people.

The school district is a major employer of local residents. Nearly 300 people work for the school district. The school district follows a policy of using local resources, businesses, and service personnel as much as possible.

The socio-economic status is similar to that found in most suburban, semi-rural communities in Western New York.

Community aspirations for education can be expressed through the composition of its Board of Education. The Akron Board is supportive of the school's administration, faculty and support personnel, while still maintaining cost-efficiency.

Cost expenditures for the district compares favorably to those of districts of similar size in Western New York. The Board of Education operates on the principle that a small school district should offer a sound education program by attracting superior educators and teachers and paying them competitive salaries.

The mission of the Akron Central School District, a learning-centered community dedicated to the dreams of our students, is to ensure that each student realizes her or her unique human potential and contributes positively to society, through a system characterized by:

- Developing all dimensions of each human being

Description of District: Alden CSD

Thanks to the first purchase of land by Jonas Van Wey in 1806, the present Town of Alden, at the eastern border of Erie County eventually came into existence. Originally a farming community buttressed by tanneries, grist and fanning mills, Alden now boasts a more cosmopolitan population. It is a small, rural/suburban community with a quiet, laid-back environment. Only 20 miles east of Buffalo, it is within easy reach of the city's business and culture, yet close to many outdoor and sporting opportunities. The 56 square mile Alden Central School District, north of the beautiful Boston Hills and at the frontier of rich farmland, stretches into three counties and serves six towns.

It is Alden Central School's self-proclaimed mission to educate students to their fullest potential within an environment that nurtures positive growth in social and emotional behavior and attitudes.

ACS offers a comprehensive program for students who are college bound, exploring trade schools, joining the work place, or aspiring to join the military. The school is also responsible for the educational services provided at the Erie County Correctional Facility which is located within the District boundaries. Across the spectrum of its curriculum from textbook to District-assigned personal computing devices, the best in traditional and technological innovation can be witnessed at Alden.

ACS is proud of its commitment to holistic education. Many extracurricular clubs and activities provide the chance for students to enrich their academic schooling. Over 75% of the student body is involved in athletics. There are 44 interscholastic sports teams. The Alden community looks toward annual events such as the renowned band and chorus concerts, plays, musicals, and a Homecoming Weekend.

ACS offers its students and community a chapter for the Dollars for Scholars Foundation, an extensive community education program, a unique Teachers Center, and a Universal Pre-Kindergarten program. In addition, Alden CSD hosts its own District news webpage at WACS.aldenschools.org. WACS News students from the High School cover stories District-Wide and create digital content for the webpage to celebrate all of the incredible programs throughout the District. ACSD is also the proud home of Bulldog Manufacturing, a student-run company at Alden High School, providing students with real-world experience in an educational setting. The team includes students from various academic backgrounds working across five departments for a unique, hands-on learning experience.

Alden Central provides the Alden community with strong, inspiring education for the students of today, and is preparing daily for relevant education to benefit the students of tomorrow.

Description of District: Amherst CSD

The Amherst Central School District, located in a first-ring suburb of Buffalo, has an enrollment of approximately 3,044 students across two elementary schools for students PreK-5, a middle school for grades 6-8 and a high school for grades 9-12. A diverse district that consistently earns state and national recognition for its academic, music, athletics and character education programs, we offer a comprehensive educational program to all students, including those needing special education.

Amherst has adopted an expansive plan to incorporate state-of-the-art equipment into every phase of the educational system. Integrated learning environments enhance the teaching process in vital new ways of encouraging problem solving, exploration and creativity in the classroom. The district's music and art programs have been recognized throughout the state for their excellence. A full range of athletic interscholastic and extracurricular club opportunities are available to students. At the high school level, students are able to enroll in advanced placement courses, as well as career and technical courses leading to CTE technical endorsement diploma seal.

In 2024, approximately seventy-nine percent (75%) of our graduates (155) continued their education. Sixty-three percent of our graduates planned to attend a 4-year college and 12% plan to attend a 2 year college. The Board of Cooperative Services (BOCES) provides special occupational and vocational education for some of our students, as well as students of 18 other subscribing school districts. There are 327 faculty members and support staff of about 242.

Our Partners:

- Our district partners with St. Paul's Lutheran Church to offer a collaborative food pantry known as the Tiger's Den Food Pantry. The pantry is housed at the church and serves families from the Amherst Central School District.
- The ACSD Family Support Center has several on-site collaborative partners including the Parent Network of WNY, Mental Health Advocates of WNY and NAMI – National Alliance on Mental Health Illness Buffalo & Erie County. The FSC is housed at St. Paul's Lutheran Church.
- The Amherst Central Alumni Foundation awards grants for the enrichment of the Amherst School District student population via programs and materials not covered by the annual school budget.
- Three active Parent Teacher Associations support home-to-school partnerships through the PTAs at Smallwood Drive Elementary, Windermere Boulevard Elementary and a combined Middle School/High School PTSA.
- The Amherst Tigers Booster Club strives to enhance the athletic experience and environment for student athletes, fans, families and the community.

Description of District: Buffalo City

Buffalo, "The Queen City to the Great Lakes" and border city to Canada, is located at the eastern shore of Lake Erie and on the Niagara River. The Buffalo City School District serves an urban population and takes pride in the numerous exemplary and special programs available to its students. Ranging from early childhood centers to highly technical vocational and academic programs, the school district continues to enhance its students' educational experiences while challenging them to meet the latest New York State standards.

In elementary grades, parents have many options from which to choose. There are highly individualized programs available throughout the city. Schools offer a wide range of courses, including intense concentrations in science, math, or the performing arts, the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program and Discovery-Based learning.

While all Buffalo schools prepare students to be college and career-ready, secondary options include high schools featuring arts and communication, business programs, and vocational programs specializing in auto mechanics, engineering, horticulture, culinary/hospitality, technology, manufacturing, construction, and transportation. The Buffalo Public Schools also have numerous specialized programs for students with disabilities, bilingual students, and the adult population.

In recent years, several schools have been recognized for their academic achievements. Among them, in 2024, City Honors School was the only school in Western New York and one of 356 nationwide to receive National Blue-Ribbon recognition from the U.S. Department of Education. Additionally, Frederick Law Olmsted Elementary School #64 in 2019 and Leonardo da Vinci High School in 2020 were also recognized as National Blue-Ribbon schools.

The Buffalo City School District is committed to offering its students many dynamic educational options in keeping with the diverse nature of its student population. We will continue to address the needs of today while preparing our students for the challenges of tomorrow. With these goals in mind, we are aware that parents, children, and the entire community are partners in the educational process and must work together to make a difference. As such, we will continue the important work to ensure that our students receive the type and quality of education needed to succeed.

Description of District: Cheektowaga-Sloan UFSD

DISTRICT BACKGROUND:

The Cheektowaga-Sloan Schools border the City of Buffalo and are located in the southwest corner of the Town of Cheektowaga. The District encompasses the Village of Sloan, a portion of South Cheektowaga, and a portion of the Town of West Seneca. The District maintains four schools, John F. Kennedy High School (9-12), John F. Kennedy Middle School (6-8), Theodore Roosevelt Elementary (Pre-K–2), and Woodrow Wilson Elementary (3-5), serving a student population of approximately 1,277. The District employs a professional staff of approximately 132 and a support staff of approximately 100.

The District is committed to meeting the needs of all of its students and maximizing each student's ability. At the High School, major emphasis is placed on academic subjects. The teacher consultant/co-teaching model is used for those students with additional academic needs. Approximately 82% of graduates continue on to advanced educational institutions. Students are given opportunities to receive college credit in advanced placement subjects such as English, math and social studies. Seniors also can earn college credit while still in high school by participating in the Early Admission Program at nearby universities. Many options are available in occupational education courses. Students with special needs are assisted through specialized programs including modified and self-contained classes, remedial courses in math, reading, writing and social studies. Numerous extra-curricular programs, including fine arts, journalism, athletics and community service, enhance the students' total educational program.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS:

The John F. Kennedy High School, previously known as Sloan High School, was dedicated in 1962 and named in honor of President John F. Kennedy during his term in office, the first such school to honor him. The thirteen and one half-acre campus is located in the suburban community of Cheektowaga. Before 1997, the building housed grades 7-12, however it has since been divided into separate middle and high school facilities. The high school provides learners with many amenities, including access to innovative computer technologies; science laboratories, technology shop labs, and orchestra rooms; auditorium and gymnasium facilities with a natatorium; and a full-service cafeteria. The campus also includes a football, track and field stadium, tennis courts, baseball and softball diamonds, soccer fields and additional practice fields.

John F. Kennedy High School strives to set high expectations for all learners in order to ensure that they are college and career ready. The school provides learners with a variety of opportunities to, not only meet their individual goals, but to help them realize their dreams. The school's educational program is designed based on a 21st century learning model which emphasizes pathways for success in the areas of Humanities, The Arts, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math), and Business and Career. Within each pathway, students are able to accelerate their course work through advanced placement, honors classes, or college credit bearing coursework.

For those students who are experiencing difficulties in meeting grade-level expectations, JFK HS offers workshops in English, Math, Science, and/or Social Studies. Through small group instruction, students will have a scheduled time to receive additional support tailored to their individual academic needs. Another support structure in place at the high school is the Academic Learning Center, or ALC. Using a college model for student-initiated support and remediation, the ALC supports all learners through curriculum and instruction designed to meet college and career readiness expectations. Services offered include online learning and credit recovery, small group re-teaching and tutoring with teachers or peers, skills development (study strategies, organization and time management, and test taking skills), homework support, Regents preparation and remediation, and even SAT and ACT prep.

At the John F. Kennedy Middle School, the faculty and staff are dedicated to creating a positive learning environment that recognized the unique needs and talents of adolescents by combining character education with a curriculum based on critical thinking in order to create lifelong learners prepared for an ever-changing global society.

The educational program at the middle school addresses the needs of our diverse learning population by providing learners with opportunities for acceleration, enrichment, as well as support services. Currently, the middle school offers acceleration in math and science, which lead to Regents credit in Common Core Integrated Algebra and Earth Science. Students who are excelling in their coursework may also be placed into honors level courses in ELA and math, which creates a solid foundation and the potential for them to progress seamlessly on a pathway toward Advanced Placement courses in high school.

Support services are available to all students with an emphasis on building literacy and math foundational skills, providing assistance with class assignments and homework, as well as other forms of remediation. Academic learning supports are provided to all students through the middle school Academic Learning Center (ALC) Tuesday through Friday. Finally, students and staff are further enriched by the middle school's formalized partnership with Buffalo State College, which offers specialized one-on-one tutoring and classroom support from educators enrolled in the college's teacher education and preparation program. The consultant teacher model is available for students with a disability and there is one district self-contained (15:1:1) classroom for students in grades 6-8.

Students in 7th grade are introduced to the languages and cultures of either France or Spain, as well as music, the arts, and technology. The middle school's physical education curriculum promotes the philosophy of fitness for life. Students are offered an array of extra-curricular programs in the arts, music and sports. All students are involved in Character Education development through building initiatives centered on Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and building-wide character education activities.

Woodrow Wilson Elementary School is located in the Village of Sloan for students in grades 3, 4, and 5. Woodrow Wilson is committed to providing an educational environment which promotes learning and where all students are given the opportunity to not only experience measurable academic growth, but to experience significant social and emotional growth as well. We are confident that our educational environment at Woodrow Wilson will enable all students to maintain a positive self-concept. We have created and implemented a strong bully-prevention program, which emphasizes good character, how to be a good friend, and how to handle bullying. Students also participate in a behavioral program called PBIS, which stands for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports, where they are eligible to win incentives for appropriate behavior in the classroom and throughout the school.

Teachers have implemented the Common Core Learning Standards, where high expectations and rigorous activities are taught in the areas of English Language Arts and Mathematics. Students participate in many interactive and engaging learning activities, including the use of technology, discussion with their peers and cooperative learning. The use of the Accelerated Reader program promotes independent reading, and each student has a goal that they must reach each marking period. The library serves as a hub for learning, reading, research, and to foster students' love for reading.

Theodore Roosevelt School in the Town of Cheektowaga houses Pre-K and Kindergarten through second grade. Our teachers are committed to "building a foundation for personal growth and learning". The emphasis of our educational program is placed on the whole child so that he/she can grow academically, socially, physically, culturally and emotionally.

TECHNOLOGY & 21ST CENTURY LEARNING:

The Cheektowaga-Sloan Union Free School District continues to provide our students and community with the necessary technology needed to learn 21st Century skills. The district maintains a strong collaborative relationship with Erie 1 BOCES, who helps manage our technology services in order to have the most robust and cutting-edge forms of technology. Students have access to Smart Boards, student computers, laptop carts and software that enhances the learning process. Students engage in research, the creation of projects, and other activities that will help them become 21st Century learners.

Description of District: Clarence CSD

Description of District: Cleveland Hill UFSD

The Cleveland Hill School District is a small district located in the suburban community of the Town of Cheektowaga, a first ring suburb of Buffalo, New York. The western border of the district is the City of Buffalo. Nearly all the property in the district is residential with very little commercial and no industrial property.

The Cleveland Hill community is a small working/middle class neighborhood of single-family homes and apartments, with a handful of upscale properties. Most homes were built during the post-World War II building boom, to serve workers in Cheektowaga's growing industrial and research development industries. Many families have lived in the district for generations and their children are second, third and fourth generation Cleveland Hill district attendees. Centers in the community are the school, churches and the volunteer fire department, in addition to libraries and Cheektowaga Town Park.

Our students are racially and ethnically diverse: 39.8% are White, 32.5% are African-American, 5.5% are Hispanic, 13% are Asian, 8.1% are Multiracial, .6% are American Indian and .14% are Pacific Islander. A small minority of students are recent immigrants. This diverse population presents the district with a rich mix of students.

Cleveland Hill is a single campus district educating 1365 students with one elementary, one middle and one high school located on a 28-acre site in the center of the district.

Cleveland Hill is proud of our investment in technology. We have moved to a 1-to-1 initiative with respect to all students, UPK through twelve. This has enabled our students to get the most out of learning both in-person and at home.

Cleveland Hill Elementary School houses Universal Pre-Kindergarten to fifth grade. The various academic programs and supports offer a highly engaging and responsive learning environment to meet the unique needs of all learners and prepare our students to be successful in a changing world. A multi-tiered system of support is utilized to equip our students with the tools necessary to thrive academically, socially, emotionally, and behaviorally. Cleveland Hill Elementary school is committed to creating a kind, safe, and nurturing school environment for all.

Cleveland Hill Middle School, serving students in grades six through eight, provides students with a nurturing and supportive small school environment, while promoting diversity and individualized opportunities for all students. Hands on, project-based learning is evident through cross curricular collaborations at each grade level. Students are assigned to a team of teachers who focus on each student's academic, social-emotional health and character development through a multi-tiered system of support. Cleveland Hill Middle School is committed and dedicated to ensuring all students succeed, advance to the next level in a high-quality environment where they are developing into the best version of them self!

At Cleveland Hill High School, academic, extracurricular and support programs focus on building student self-efficacy, which is the confidence and skills necessary to be successful in an ever-evolving world. They prepare students for post-secondary goals, with a wide selection of college credit bearing courses and work-readiness programs. Students can earn up to five units of Foreign Language where the final two units earn them college credit, or they can engage in a Career and Technical Education sequence, culminating in an internship with one of our local community partners. Knowing that this transformation does not happen all at once, they begin preparing their students for the expectations of high school with their Freshman Seminar program, where many of our students go on to be Freshman Mentors in their junior and senior year. CHHS offers a wide array of extracurricular, athletic, and interscholastic clubs and competitions for students to participate in, placing a value on creating opportunities for our students to experience new endeavors and develop different skills outside of the academic setting. Cleveland Hill High School is a diverse community. A strong culture and sense of pride in their school make it a safe and inviting environment where all students can, "Soar Toward Success."

The Student Support Department works diligently to meet the social/emotional needs of both the student body and their families. District psychologists, school counselors and social workers meet with parents and students alike, in the school setting, home setting and at the Cleveland Hill Family Resource Center.

Music and athletics have always been areas of high interest for students and the community. Instrumental music lessons begin for students in fourth grade, and there is a band and chorus from fourth to twelfth grade. Our student musicians have received a number of awards for performance and we offer a full complement of interscholastic athletics with some of the most competitive athletic programs in the state.

The Cleveland Hill School District is geographically small when compared to many of its neighbors in Erie County, and though their student enrollment is in the median range for the state, it is lower than most other districts in the county. While this presents some challenges, it also provides an outstanding opportunity to maximize on these characteristics, offering teachers and staff the opportunity to meet the needs of a diverse student body. The district is able to focus on the individual learner to support academic excellence and social responsibility in preparation for higher education or the world of work.

Description of District: Depew UFSD

The Depew Union Free School District is a welcoming, nurturing and proud school District founded on doing whatever it takes for its students. Description of District: East Aurora UFSD

The East Aurora Union Free School District, formed in 1875, is located 15 miles southeast of Buffalo, New York. East Aurora is a suburban middle-class school district, encompassing the Town of Aurora, the Village of East Aurora, and part of the Towns of Colden and Elma. Its early history reflects varied community enterprises', including sawmills and trade. From another historical perspective, East Aurora is perhaps best distinguished as the home of President Millard Fillmore and Elbert Hubbard, a highly celebrated promoter of artisans and self-sufficiency. The Roycroft movement grew out of Hubbard's work and lends a special character to the Village of East Aurora. The community has many resident artisans and has secured landmark status for several of its historical buildings.

East Aurora experiences limited steady growth each year. Residential neighborhoods blend into a strong sense of community. East Aurora regularly enjoys community-wide events, shows, and gatherings, including the annual East Aurora Music Fest, Artwalk, Car Show, Aurora Theater Productions, and the Roycroft Artists' Show.

The East Aurora School District, comprised of three schools (elementary, middle, and high), enjoys an excellent reputation in Western New York and throughout the state as a system dedicated to its students, staff, and community.

Parkdale Elementary provides an educational environment that enables all students to begin their journey to becoming lifelong learners and successful members of the community. With a focus on the whole child and early literacy, Parkdale offers diversified programming that meets the needs of each student. Social skills and responsibility are incorporated into all aspects of learning, and students are encouraged to explore their creativity through a number of music and art programs. In addition, Parkdale has a strong relationship with the community, offering a variety of activities throughout the year that bring families together.

The East Aurora Middle School offers a strong academic program, multiple clubs and modified athletics to a student body of approximately 500 students in grades 5 - 8. While the main focus is academic, the development of the whole person is at the heart of all program development. Strong emphasis is placed on equipping students with the necessary academic and social knowledge skills and attitudes to succeed in the middle-level grades, high school and beyond. In doing so, we strive to instill a sense of positive self-worth, self-respect, self-confidence, and a belief that each can succeed.

In addition to a full range of basic education and occupational/vocational programs the East Aurora High School (EAHS) offers students a wide variety of options including several foreign languages, advanced sciences and mathematics, humanities, 19 AP courses including a 2-year college-level AP Capstone curriculum, a NYS Career Technical Education (CTE) endorsed business sequence, a 2-year Global Leadership Academy multi-disciplinary program, a 4-year multi-disciplinary STEAM initiative, a Film Academy, and Blue Devil Design; a student-led business that offers students the opportunity to combine technical and business skills in a Capstone 2-year program. East Aurora High School consistently ranks among the top performing high schools in the WNY region and for over 30 consecutive years, EAHS has been recognized as one of New York's top performing high schools. The New York State Board of Education Department names EAHS a "Reward School" for the 2021-2022 school year. Schools selected for this recognition have the highest achievement rates in the state with no significant gaps in achievement. In 2023, the Washington Post and Newsweek magazine selected EAHS as one of the nation's top high schools. Both the East Aurora High School (2017) and Middle School (2012) have earned prestigious recognition as National Blue Ribbon Schools of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education. Sixty-eight percent (68%) of the Class of 2024 earned Regents diplomas with an Advanced Designation. One hundred and ninety (190) EAHS students participated in Advanced Placement (AP) programs. A total of 379 exams were administered. Additionally, the high school offers a well-rounded interscholastic athletic program comprising championship teams in basketball, cross-country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, track and volleyball. The program also includes unified sports, football, wrestling, field hockey, softball and baseball. There are approximately 540 students enrolled in grades 9-12. Special education classes are offered through BOCES (Board of Educational Services) and account for an additional twenty students at EAHS.

Description of District: Eden CSD

Career & Technical Education offers 20 program areas to eligible high school students and adults. Students enrolled in a New York State-approved CTE program will acquire the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in post-secondary education and employment. Students experience a relevant, challenging, and well-organized curriculum, supported by current technology and learning environments that foster high academic achievement and skill development and make students eligible for college credit. Students successfully completing CTE programs are eligible to apply for college credits through articulation agreements with various post-secondary institutions.

P-TECH

Pathways to Early College High Schools offer a multi-year program for students offering a project-based, differentiated learning culture with specialized educators working in tandem with higher education, business partners and component school districts to support students as they obtain a NYS Regents Diploma and an associate's degree, in addition to several certifications through industry partnerships. A cornerstone of this program is additional hours of instructional time designed to introduce students to industries in the region, project-based learning, career exploration and industry terminology, standards and employment professional skills.

Alternative Ed.

Alternative Education programs are designed for students who perform academically, socially and/or behaviorally outside the acceptable norms of a traditional school culture. Alternative Education programs lead to graduation for students in Grades 7 through 12. Academic needs are addressed, including preparation for state assessments and instruction that will enable them to earn high school credit toward graduation. The curriculum and academic environment has been structured to increase attendance and graduation rates by ensuring that each student meets his or her academic potential up to and including graduating with their Regent's Diploma.

Special Education

The Special Education program provides services to special needs students with varied educational needs from all component school districts. Services provided by teachers, teacher aides, and related service providers are determined by the information included in each student's Individualized Education Plan. Instruction is based on the Common Core State Learning Standards. Special classes and related services are available during the regular school year and the extended summer school program. A team effort by itinerant service professionals to support the classroom teacher in meeting the demands of the Common Core State Learning Standards ensure that each student achieves his or her academic potential. These services include Speech and Language Therapy, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Transition Services, Social Work and Counseling, Assistive Technology, Services for the Visually and Hearing Impaired, and Behavioral Support Services.

Instructional Support Services

The Instructional Support Services (ISS) Division provides a blend of educational materials, distance learning, technology, integrated education services, health, wellness and science resources & supports, and education enrichment programs. Programs include: Distance Learning, the School Library System, the Instructional Media Center, Environmental Education, Arts in Education, the E2CCB Print Shop, and Integrated Education Services such as School Improvement, Model Schools, Data Management Programs.

ISS also oversees Technology Services that provides technical assistance, supportive educational resources, and consultation services for integrating technology across curriculum areas.

Adult Education & Workforce Development

The Adult Education and Workforce Development division of Erie 2-Chautauqua-Cattaraugus BOCES strives to help those 18 and older develop the skills and get the experience necessary for personal and professional success. Occupational preparation in 20-some Career & Technical programs-including cosmetology, construction trades, health services, commercial driver's license training and more – is offered at our educational centers and state-of-the-art instructional sites. Skill training and academic content in each course prepares students for the workplace as the programs are designed with employers in mind. Literacy instruction and preparation for the Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC) are also available along with career counseling and guidance in obtaining financial aid.

Management Services

Management Services provides a variety of non-classroom based programs from our Central Business Office (Accounts Payable, Claims Auditing, General Ledger/Accounting and Payroll) to Labor Relations, Safety/Risk Management, Human Resources, Public Relations, Grant Procurement and Cooperative Bidding.

Description of District: Frontier CSD

The Frontier Central School District is located in the Town of Hamburg, along the beautiful shores of Lake Erie and in the shadow of the Peace Bridge to Canada. The District, with an estimated population of 38,000, comprises a suburban area of approximately 39 miles in the southern portion of Erie County, New York.

Student enrollment for the 2024-2025 school year is 4,477, making Frontier one of the larger school districts in the suburban region of Buffalo, New York. Frontier Central has four elementary schools: Big Tree, Blasdell, Cloverbank and Pinehurst; a Middle School, Grades 6-8; and a High School, Grades 9-12. Big Picture Academy, now in its second year, is a small innovative high school that utilizes a research-based, multi-faceted educational model.

Administration and the Board of Education continue to closely monitor student population growth patterns within the geographic boundaries of the District, as new housing developments continue to be developed.

Frontier Central is committed to providing its students with a challenging, rigorous education preparing them to be ready for college, the military or a career. In order to meet the needs of all students, the District provides a variety of programs and services to effectively support the educational process.

The District is in the midst of the SOAR (Safety, Operations, Academics, Renovations) Project, its \$70.1 million capital improvement initiative, which has already yielded impressive results, with more on the way.

Phase 1 took place in 2022 and 2023. New playgrounds were installed at all four elementary schools. The High School baseball and softball stadiums were completed last year and would be the envy of many college programs. They feature grandstand seating, synthetic turf, dugouts and batting cages. Blasdell now has a new bus loop that has made entering and exiting the school easier for vehicles. Classroom renovations were completed at Pinehurst in Phase 1; additional work is planned for Phase 4, the final phase of the overall project.

Phase 2 incorporated substantial work on the Middle School, and the results have been stunning. The pool – which was original to the school and hadn't been used in several years due to disrepair – has been totally renovated from top to bottom, with new locker rooms as well. The result is a beautiful, well-lighted pool decorated in Frontier blue and white. The new fitness center features Gronk Fitness Equipment – a line of equipment promoted by retired All-Pro tight end and four-time Super Bowl champion Rob Gronkowski. The technology wing is also completely redesigned and features all new equipment with a new dust collection system.

The new multi-purpose synthetic turf field was also completed this year. The multi-purpose field, along with the baseball and softball stadiums, all have new LED lighting.

Phase 3 will encompass extensive work at the High School. There will be a major renovation to the main office, a new STEAM suite, gymnasium and auditorium renovations, an overhaul of the kitchen and serving lines, and a total renovation of the pool so it looks much like the Middle School pool. Secured entries and other safety measures have been added at all schools in the District.

Technology enhances student learning in a variety of ways throughout the District. Integrated into the curriculum, technology offers teachers and students opportunities for addressing different learning styles through differentiated instruction, helping to meet all levels of students' needs.

Each of the District's four elementary schools offers a nurturing, caring, child-centered environment that fosters strong academic success and social-emotional well-being. Emphasis is placed on developing confident students who are able to apply skills and knowledge to real-life situations, and act in a responsible, respectful manner. In addition, each of the elementary buildings provides access to STEAM materials and resources that help to ignite and develop creativity.

Academic intervention in core subject areas, as well as a full continuum of special education services, including coteaching, are available for students who qualify. Both District Pre-kindergarten programs, as well as programs offered in collaboration with Head Start and EduKids, are available to District residents. Additionally, the District contracts with an outside provider (Right at School) for before and after school care in all four of our elementary schools. Frontier Middle School faculty and staff work with students to develop greater responsibility and independence as arts.

Students attending Frontier High School are offered a comprehensive program of academics, business, fine arts and vocational programs. Advanced placement courses are offered in several subject areas. The collective accomplishment of a graduating class is often viewed as an indicator of a strong, highly successful school district. The Frontier Class of 2024 reflected continuous improvement in the District's instructional program.

Research indicates that students who are involved in school activities are those who are the most successful in life. Frontier Central offers a wide variety of extra-curricular experiences for students, including a Music Program that has received national recognition in the past from the Music Educators National Conference, which named Frontier as one of the top 100 school districts for the study of music.

Frontier's comprehensive interscholastic sports programs offer the chance for more than 1,500 athletes to compete on 78 athletic teams. Frontier Athletics takes pride in our Middle School sports programs and is one of a few schools that offer multiple modified teams in sports such as Football, Cheerleading, Girls Soccer, Boys and Girls Volleyball, Boys Basketball, and Boys Baseball. We also offer multiple Unified athletic teams, which is a New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHAA) sponsored sport team in conjunction with Special Olympics. Frontier has also been recognized by NYSPHAA as a Scholar Athlete School of Excellence.

Commitment to on-going professional growth for Frontier teachers is a major area of focus, ensuring that curriculum and instruction are taught to students in the most effective, rigorous manner. Courses are offered throughout the school year to staff. In addition to staff development provided by the District, training is offered through the Southtowns Teachers' Center, a collaborative partnership with Frontier Central, Hamburg Central School District and Randolph Academy (Hamburg). The District also works closely with Erie 1 BOCES for professional development, workshops and training sessions.

Description of District: Gowanda CSD

The Gowanda Central School District is geographically located in the counties of Erie, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua. The District also provides educational services to students residing on the Cattaraugus Territory of the Seneca Nation of Indians.

The District is organized along a PK-12 plan with approximately 430 students in our PK-4 Elementary School and approximately 650 distributed equally in 5-8 Middle School and 9-12 High School. We maintain two educational campuses and one athletic facility. During the 2024-2025 school year, the total enrollment, including out-of-district placements, equals 1,079 students. Approximately 25% of our students are Native American, 12% are Multiracial, 5% are of Hispanic, Asian or African American origin and the remaining 63% are Caucasian students.

The campuses are situated in the Town of Perrysburg and the Village of Gowanda. The District spans portions of the Townships of Collins, North Collins, Hanover, Persia, Perrysburg and Dayton and the Cattaraugus Territory.

The administrative team consists of the Superintendent, three Building Principals, Assistant Principal, Director of Learning and Continual Improvement, Director of Special Education, School Business Administrator, Technology Director, Director of Facilities, School Lunch Manager, Title VI Program Director and Transportation Supervisor. The Districts employs a teaching faculty numbering 145 teachers, 30 teaching assistants/aides and a support staff of 93 individuals. We maintain our own in-house transportation and food service departments. Since 2002, the District has engaged in numerous capital projects, including the construction of a new Middle School and athletic facility, totaling more than \$37 million. In 2012 the District dedicated a new \$4 million High School Science wing. The District is in the process of completing the voter approved a \$30 million capital improvement project that consists of renovations of instructional space in all three buildings, bridge replacement, land purchase and artificial turf on baseball and softball fields,

The educational program is comprehensive and includes the core curriculum, performing arts, technology, home & careers, interscholastic athletics, student clubs and extra-curricular activities. Teachers, staff and students utilize up-to-date learning and office technology. Distance learning opportunities are also available to our students via live video broadcasting. Vocational and special education services are provided in part by the Erie II-Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Board of Cooperative Educational Services. The District also offers a full-range of special education programs for special needs students in all three buildings.

The District enjoys strong community support for its educational, interscholastic athletic and performing arts programs. The music program has received regional and national recognition. Sharing of resources and expertise also exists between School Districts and local municipalities. The Board of Education is dedicated to working together with the community to create a gathering place to share ideas and promote the general welfare of our students.

Description of District: Grand Island CSD

Grand Island is one of the world's largest fresh water islands and is situated in the Niagara River between the cities of Buffalo and Niagara Falls. The island is 7.5 miles long and 6 miles wide with 21 miles of river frontage. The island divides the Niagara River into East and West branches, joining again at the north end before flowing over Niagara Falls. The 21,897 residents appreciate a full range of government services and civic groups in a mix of residential, shopping and light industrial areas.

Our schools enjoy strong support from the community. Our seven-member Board of Education has a consistent record of commitment and support of our schools. The boundaries of the school district and the Town of Grand Island are the same.

There are three elementary schools in the district including one school that services students in Pre-K, kindergarten, grade one and two schools that service grades two through five. The Middle School contains grades six through eight and is located on the same campus as the High School. It shares the auditorium and pool with the high school but is separate in all other respects. The High School features a variety of programs, including advanced placement and college level offerings. Advanced Placement courses are offered in Psychology, English Language, English Literature, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Calculus, Statistics, World History, United States History, US Government and Macroeconomics, Music Theory, and Art. Those interested in college coursework in languages other than English may enroll in College Spanish, or College French, for university college credit. Grand Island High School also offers courses through Syracuse University, Niagara University, ECCC and NCCC.

The Grand Island High School campus has been recently renovated with updated science labs, a remodeled auditorium and a 21st Century Library. The building also added a STEM Technology wing, designed to enhance career and college readiness.

Approximately 81% of our graduating students in 2024 attended two and/or four-year institutions. Approximately 2% of our graduating students are going into the US Military. Approximately 11% of our graduating students are going in the workforce. New York State Regents with Advanced Designation with Honors diplomas were awarded to 8% of the graduating class, the New York State Regents with Advanced Designation diplomas were awarded to 63% of the graduating class, 29% earned regents endorsed diplomas and 0% earned Local diplomas. The mean SAT scores for the Class of 2024 was 1113.

The Grand Island School District participates in services of Erie 1 BOCES. Offerings include programs in a wide variety of career and technical courses.

Description of District: Iroquois CSD

We are focused on building strong academic experiences specific to our unique needs, developing healthy character education components and a broadly based athletic program. All designed to, when taken together, assure a sound and rigorous education as well as a robust arts education program.

The Board of Education is vitally interested in developing policies to create an educational environment dedicated to both the understanding and respecting of the many cultures that enrich our community. Within this framework our main goal is the successful preparation for our students to achieve whatever aspirations they have for life after high school. Description of District: Lake Shore CSD

The Lake Shore Central School District, also known as Evans-Brant Central School District, is located in southern Erie County about 21 miles south of Buffalo, NY, with 12 miles of its western boundary on the Lake Erie shoreline. It is 65 square miles and includes the Towns of Brant, Evans, and Eden, as well as the Villages of Angola and Farnham, and serves the Seneca Nation Territory. The District was consolidated in 1961, and a large part of the land in the District is dedicated to agriculture. The primary employers include the District itself, with 49% of its employees residing within the District; and Goya Foods. In addition, one of the region's architectural treasures, Graycliff Estate designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, is located within the District.

There are five school buildings and one educational center with an enrollment of approximately 2,125 students, PreK through 12th grade, in 2024-25. Also, 4% of the total student population of the District attend private schools, while another 4% of pupils attend out-of-district schools for students with disabilities, alternative education, and Preschool. These students remain the responsibility of the District. Co-curricular programming is diverse and responsive to student needs at all building levels. Approximately 74% of the District's students are White, 17.6% are Native American, 1.4% are African-American, 4.3% are Hispanic, 0.85% are Asian, 0% are Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, 1.3% are multi-racial, and 23% of students are classified as students with disabilities. The free and reduced lunch rate was 42% in 2023-24.

In 2024-25 the District initiated a Universal PreK program which is housed in the William T. Hoag Educational Center. There are three K-5 elementary buildings. The Middle School (grades 6-8) offers a range of programs and services to the District's early adolescent population, including accelerated and remediation programs, and a variety of co-curricular programs. The High School offers a comprehensive educational program in full compliance with the New York State Education Department's graduation requirements. The High School also houses programs from the Erie 2 Chautauqua-Cattaraugus BOCES Career and Technical Educational Center, and an Academy of Business & Finance sponsored by the National Academy Foundation. In addition, Advanced Placement and college credit courses are available to all students, as is a summer school program that serves all levels. Response to Intervention (RtI) is also offered District-wide. Students throughout the District are engaged in various community service projects.

One hundred percent of the teaching staff at Lake Shore is categorized as highly qualified by the NYS Education Department. The teacher-to-student ratio is about 1:18, and the District provides an on-going program of staff and curriculum development. Strong, positive relationships between the District and the community are further enhanced by active parent-teacher groups.

Lake Shore offers a comprehensive technology system. Each classroom is equipped with computer access with more available to students in labs, media centers, and computer carts. The District boasts over 3,000 desktop, laptops, Chromebooks and iPads. Also, every classroom has access to voice, video and data within the District's infrastructure. The District currently issues over 1,500 personal learning devices to students in grades 3-12. The District has 250 hot spots from T-Mobile's Project 10Million Program to provide families without internet access the ability to have students continue school work from home.

A comprehensive inter- and intra-scholastic athletic program serves all secondary grade level students with a variety of teams. Lake Shore has an award-winning, nationally-recognized music department with band, chorus and orchestra programs at the elementary, middle and high school levels. There is strong support for both the visual arts and drama programs. The District's Community Education Program provides multiple opportunities for residents to expand their learning opportunities throughout the year. The District houses programs for Buffalo Hearing and Speech, Erie 2 Chautauqua-Cattaraugus BOCES, and the Boys and Girls Club of Lake Shore, including a District run Universal Pre-K program.

The community offers a wide variety of activities and access to beautiful beaches on Lake Erie, including Evangola State Park, Lake Erie Beach Park, Evans Town Park, Bennett Beach, and Wendt Beach. Community-sponsored recreational programs make use of the School District's physical education facilities, including Olympic size pools at the Middle and High School buildings, and a Fitness Center & Indoor Track for community members that is located in the Lake Shore High School. Description of District: Lancaster CSD

Centralized in 1954, the Lancaster Central School District has a rich history of providing quality education for students in grades pre-K through 12. With more than 30,000 alumni scattered throughout the country and the world, our success stories are too numerous to mention.

The instructional program features grouping at all levels, a wide range of remedial services, special education for varying needs, advanced placement, and honors courses. Lancaster is noted for its career academies, including the nationally-recognized Academy of Finance as well as academies for Health Careers, the Visual and Performing Arts, Hospitality and Tourism, Leadership, and Trades. Project Lead the Way, a nationally recognized technology and pre-engineering curriculum is also offered from Grades 5 through 12. Electives in the upper grades and occupational and specialized vocational programs are available, both through the district and Erie 1 BOCES. Athletic teams have attained local and state recognition for sportsmanship and ability as well as scholastic achievement. Lancaster's 2019 graduation rate of 98% is only one representation of its commitment to the success and achievement of all students.

In 2017, the College Board recognized the Lancaster Central School District as one of 447 school districts in the United States and Canada to be placed on the AP district Honor Roll for simultaneously increasing access to advanced placement coursework while increasing the percentage of students earning scores of three or higher on AP exams. In 2018-2019, 771 AP examinations were administered to 378 students. A total of 147 AP Scholars were named, including 59 AP Scholars, 44 AP Scholars with Honors, 39 AP Scholars with Distinction and 5 National AP Scholars.

Parents are encouraged to work cooperatively with their child's teacher and the school to enhance the learning process. Parent volunteers and teacher assistants are found at the elementary level, assisting in the reinforcement of reading and math skills. The district provides numerous opportunities for parent education and information, including evening sessions. Before and after school programs are available at each of our five elementary schools. Universal Pre K is offered, on an availability basis, at the Central Avenue school building. Psychologists, social workers, speech and resource room teachers, nurses and counselors support students and families in the district. The Family Support Center, located at Lancaster Middle School, is available for confidential counseling and referral services. A long-standing partnership with the Town of Lancaster Youth Bureau further enriches the lives of students and families in the community, with special attention to families in need. Three School Resource Officers work closely with administration, staff, and students to ensure a safe learning environment at all of our schools.

Lancaster offers a richly diverse extracurricular program with more than 130 interscholastic teams, a national-class marching band, symphonic bands, a steel drum band, choral groups, and an excellent range of national award-winning publications. Our community education program features courses in more than 70 different areas and evolves as community needs dictate.

Many of these exceptional programs are featured on our comprehensive website, <u>www.lancasterschools.org</u>. Families and interested citizens may also stay informed about school news on Facebook, www.facebook.com/lancastercsd and Twitter, @lancastercsd.

Our facilities are well-maintained and updated through regularly-scheduled capital projects that take advantage of state aid opportunities. Capital projects have provided wireless internet access and a supportive technology infrastructure in all schools, as well as improved safety measures, in addition to creative and innovative use of learning spaces. Chromebooks support the instructional programs K-12, inviting students and teachers into a 21st century learning environment; student "techsperts" help teachers and peers infuse technology into their everyday lives.

The Lancaster Educational and Alumni Foundation, Inc. (LEAF) was created in 2010 to provide financial support for academic, athletic, and extracurricular activities for students of the Lancaster Central School District. LEAF partners with businesses, alumni, organizations, and parents to provide supplemental programming that the district's budget cannot support. LEAF is currently undertaking capital fundraising campaign that will leverage state aid monies to provide enhancements to athletic facilities at Lancaster High School. More information about LEAF can be found at www.nyleaf.org.

The Lancaster Central School District is situated in the north-central portion of Erie County, about 10 miles east of Buffalo, New York, and encompasses approximately 40 square miles. Easy access to main thruways and highways is within minutes, as is the Buffalo-Niagara International Airport. The district is located within the town and village of Lancaster, town of Cheektowaga, town of Elma and village of Depew. Following a peak in housing development in the late 1990s and early 2000s enrollment has stabilized. The district remains roughly 30 percent developed and much of the village flavor of the community survives.

Description of District: Maryvale UFSD

The Cheektowaga-Maryvale Union Free School District is located in the northeast corner of the Town of Cheektowaga, in Erie County, NY, and is directly east of, and approximately nine miles from the City of Buffalo. The population of the District is approximately 20,000. The District combines the personal attention of a small district with the educational opportunities of a large, diversified school district. With the exception of the Primary School, which is located at 1 Nagel Drive in the southern section of the district, all of the school buildings are situated on a single campus at 1050 Maryvale Drive.

The Primary School, which houses students in grades PreK-2, stresses the development of literacy skills integrated throughout the core curricula of mathematics, science, social studies, the arts, library, science, physical education and instructional technology.

Intermediate School students attending grades 3, 4, and 5 have the opportunity to be involved in after school activities including music. A paired classroom teaching organization is available at all grade levels along with the extensive integration of Special Education students. Support services are provided in reading, mathematics, speech, OT, PT and ENL. Special area classes include Physical Education. Art, Music and Computer Technology.

The Middle School houses students in grades 6-8. The overall program has been developed to meet the changing needs of Middle School students. The curriculum offered includes the core academic subjects and foreign languages. Acceleration is offered to qualified students in Math, Science and Foreign Language. Exploratory courses are required in music, art, career skills, technology, and computers.

Maryvale High School serves students in grades 9-12 as they prepare for future careers and vocations. The curriculum is comprehensive, including both required and elective courses approved to meet graduation requirements. The High School offers an academic college preparatory program, as well as advanced placement courses and college articulation agreements designed to prepare students for the best of college and universities. In cooperation with Board of Cooperation Educational Services, the school is able to offer students such vocational and technical courses as graphic design, building trades, health careers and culinary.



Description of District: Tonawanda City

The Tonawanda City School District, situated in the northwest corner of Erie County at the scenic Niagara River and the Erie Canal meet. Residents appreciate the district's access to a wealth of recreational and cultural opportunities. Support services also encompass social work, counseling, psychology, speech and occupational therapy, and physical therapy. Description of District/Educational Programs: West Seneca CSD

Elementary Program

Grades Pre-K through 5 provide a thorough foundation in the skills associated with the Next Generation Learning Standards. Students are instructed in English Language Arts, Mathematics, social studies, and science. Students also receive physical education, art and instruction in music. Pre-kindergarten is offered to provide four-year-old children with the opportunity to access high-quality instruction, which is designed to foster strong foundational skills in early literacy, mathematics and social skill development. Pre-kindergarten classes are offered at several sites, including district elementary schools and various community-based organizations within the West Seneca boundaries.

In addition to the core areas, classes are provided in art, vocal and instrumental music, physical education, and library. Starting in grade 4, students may choose to study string or band instruments. All music ensembles take part in winter and spring concerts featuring both choral and instrumental music. Computer education begins at the elementary level where it is integrated into the curriculum. Internet safety classes are also taught by the librarians.

Special education classes and resource programs are offered to those children who need additional support in addition to regular classroom instruction. Opportunities for students to extend their learning and their strengths are provided to all students in a variety of formats.

Promotion from one grade level to the next is based on a thorough analysis of each child's progress. Decisions are based on the needs of the student as determined by teachers and the parents working together with the building principal. Students are graded in trimesters and report cards are issued at the end of each trimester.

Middle School Program

The middle school program in grades 6 through 8 serves as a transition from elementary school to high school. Students in middle school belong to interdisciplinary teams sharing common instructors as well as common expectations and curriculum. The middle school curriculum focuses on the Next Generation Learning Standards, in an effort to prepare students for college and career readiness. Middle school students receive a full year of instruction in English language arts, social studies, mathematics, science and a world language (grades seven and eight). Students looking to challenge themselves academically may also qualify for accelerated courses in the areas of math and science, and honors classes in social studies and English Language Arts (eighth grade). Students may meet the criteria to take Regents level courses with the possibility of earning high school credits in science and math.

Students are required to explore other courses such as: technology, health, family and consumer sciences, art, music, and physical education. In addition, students may elect to participate in chorus, band or orchestra. Each Middle school produces a winter and spring instrumental and choral concert.

The District also boasts an award-winning marching band, which features students from both middle schools. There are many extracurricular activities available for the middle school students such as interscholastic and intramural sports in addition to student government and many other participation opportunities. There are many clubs and activities available for the students to choose from such as: the school newspaper, the yearbook, book clubs, community service activities and the National Junior Honor Society.

Senior High School Program

The senior high school program (grades 9 through 12) is designed to prepare students for post-secondary education, immediate employment, or careers in the military.

A rigorous core curriculum leads students towards a variety of diploma types as a result of multiple pathways. In addition to the core areas courses, many electives are offered to add depth and scope to our students' high school education. Electives include courses in art, music, technology and business. In addition, students may attend the BOCES Occupational Center, which offers training for specific occupations.

Highly motivated students are offered advanced placement courses to enrich and accelerate their learning. Such courses may also be aligned to local colleges through articulation agreements between the colleges and the District that afford students the opportunity to earn college credits while in high school. Nationally recognized Academy Programs also highlight the offerings available to students. These "School-Within-A-School" programs afford students an opportunity to explore a career field and develop transferable academic and workplace skills, while earning both high school and college credit. Academy students will also participate in industry specific internships and have opportunities for scholarships through their academy program. Currently, the Academies include – The Academy of Finance, The Academy of Information Technology, The Academy of Visual Arts, Engineering and Academy of Life Sciences.

High School instrumental students may participate in concert band, marching band, and jazz ensemble. There are also multiple opportunities for students to participate in the choral music program. Musical productions, winter and spring instrumental and choral concerts are presented by both high schools. A full complement of junior varsity and varsity sports are also available to students.

Mental health education is an important component of the curriculum we teach. This curriculum is weaved into the academic experience across grade levels and through a variety of ways. This curriculum is taught in order to ensure students develop adequate assets and skills in regards to appropriate self-management, relationships and resource management, all essential to positive mental health and well-being.

Description of District: Pioneer CSD

The District, which was created in 1966 from the former Delevan-Machias and Arcae Central School Districts, is located approximately 40 miles south of the City of Buffalo. Encompassing some 250 square miles, the District provides New Learning Standards based instruction and enrichment to approximately 2,500 students in grades Pre-K-12.

Instructional programs are offered at four separate campuses that include Pioneer Elementary at Arcade, Pioneer Elementary at Delevan, Pioneer Middle School and Pioneer High School.

Description of District: Starpoint CSD

Starpoint Central School District is located in the southern portion of Niagara County and is just north of Erie County. Starpoint CSD consists of five townships: Town of Pendleton, Cambria, Wheatfield, Lockport and Royalton. The District is located at 4363 Mapleton Road in Lockport, NY. The district encompasses approximately 115 square miles and has a total population of about 15,000 residents and serves approximately 7,000 families.

The District was centralized after a vote was held in the five townships on June 15, 1953. Immediately following the closing of the polls, nine members were elected to the first Starpoint Board of Education. A study was subsequently completed and two sites for the new school were proposed to voters. On September 11, 1953, the original 70-acre site was chosen by the voters by a margin of 20 votes. Construction began in March of 1955. Our currently facility opened its doors to students on September 6, 1956.

Starpoint's mission is to provide a safe, nurturing, academically challenging and equitable experience that inspires all students to achieve their maximum potential. Starpoint's vision is to be the center of our community where students, staff, families, and community members are welcomed, supported individually, and engaged together in the pursuit of excellence for all.
